### Message from our treasurer, Jim Casswell

The new tax law will substantially increase the standard deduction and many of our members will not be itemizing deductions on their tax returns this year. Consequently, your charitable donations may not have as great a tax benefit. For those members in their 70's (including inherited IRA's even if the recipient is under 70 ½) faced with required minimum distribution (RMD) from retirement accounts, one way to lessen the tax impact is to make RMD payments payable directly to a charitable organization. Scrap Iron Softball Club is an eligible charitable organization.

The check can be for the full amount or any portion of the RMD, but must be made payable to the non-profit (as designated by IRS) directly. It can be mailed or forwarded to the following:
